CLASS ACTION?

As the erosion of the natural constraints continues unabated, locals are left wondering what options they have left. The river that supports towns, ecosystems, irrigation, and life seems to be collateral damage of, ironically, a plan to 'Save the Murray'.

Dairy and avocado producers, Phill and Pam O'Neill, are one of hundreds, if not thousands, of affected parties. The O'Neills, as dairy farmers, have faced numerous challenges resulting from the Murray Darling Basin Plan and corresponding water policy changes. From sky-rocketing water prices and huge reduction in allocation reliability, the O'Neills, like many, adapted, choosing to grow avo-

cados. Now as their core infrastructure is on the brink of being eroded away, who wears the cost?

Our environment is not fairing any better – Ramsar listed forest eroding, platypus, Azure kingfisher and fish habitat affected, and water quality issues. In speaking with scientists and ecologists they estimate there are as many as nine federal environment laws being broken in our region alone.

The Murray Darling Basin Plan was a \$13 billion political plan, starting with protection criteria of environment, economy and community. Now they represent more of a target list. Mid-Murray communities, food producers and our environment and ecosystems seem to be blind spots,

much like Menindee and the Lower Darling.

How does this continue, where is the press conference or even a press release by Federal Water Minister, Keith Pitt, or the Federal Environment Minister and Member for Farrer, Sussan Ley?

Does our political system actually work? Should something as precious as water be a political football kicked between lobbyists, traders and securing votes?

We will continue to expose the huge failing. The recent NSW ICAC report is nothing but damning, the most recent Productivity Commission report actually celebrates trading and expansion of permanent plantings with no consideration for land suitability, water delivery, market stability or food security.

Maybe a class action is in order? Southern Riverina Irrigators (SRI) has proven the effectiveness of such a step. SRI has repeatedly held government to account on the regular flouting of laws and the manipulation of data and reform implementation.

Basically, there appears no other choice to seek justice. Government cannot be held accountable for breaking the rules, environmental or otherwise, they are immune, untouchable.

wise, they are immune, untouchable. If political governance is allowed to continue in its current form, we are teaching the leaders of tomorrow all the wrong things to be effective. Eth-

ics, honesty, wisdom and understanding have been modernised into a noncontact form of the 'Hunger Games'. No blood, political survival is the objective and if you can get away with it, you can do it. If you can't get away with it, you and your colleagues adjust the legislation.

Parting thought: what percentage of time do water bureaucracy employees spend in an office, as opposed to looking at the problem they are trying to fix or even understand? Try it out next time your mower won't start, ring a mechanic in Canberra and ask them what's wrong.

As the facilitator of the Activities Program the Shire surely has a duty of care to provide a reliable contact service to both emergency services and families of those attending the centre.

I would welcome a plausible explanation as to why the service has been discontinued.'

I have now received the following reply via mail –

'Thank you for your letter raising concerns about the phone connection at the Cohuna Memorial Hall Senior Rooms.

The Social Support Group is ran by the Cohuna Hospital and their staff. Council has a lease agreement in place with Cohuna Hospital for the use of the Cohuna Memorial Hall – seniors room for the Social Support

If you have any concerns about safety of your family member I suggest that you contact Cohuna Hospital Staff to discuss access to mobile phones

in case of emergency."

This response has still failed to clarify any reason as to why the landline has not been reconnected.

I fail to see where the Cohuna District Hospital or any other organisation or group hiring Shire amenities are responsible for the telephone landline at the premises.

I wish to make other us-

ers aware of this as several groups use the amenities, some with elderly members, and may be unaware that the telephone service has been disconnected and, it appears, will not be reinstated by the Gannawarra Shire. Yours sincerely, Donald Forbes Cohuna







Transport New South Wales has begun maintenance works on the Barham-Koondrook Bridge which should be completed in early April. The \$1.5 million project involves repairing watertight metal retaining structures around the bridge piers to address corrosion. Work is carried out between 7am and 6pm on weekdays (weather permitting).

Reduced speed limits, including 20km/h

speed restrictions across the bridge, with an occasional delay of up to 20 minutes can be expected. There will be a maritime speed limit of four knots on the Murray River. The lift span and main travel channel will remain opera-

EDITORIAL – Southern Connected Basin Communities

Muriel Riley has lived through more than her fair share of heartache.

As a child of the stolen generation, Muriel was ripped away from her family and her beloved Baaka River when she was just five years old.

And now, 63 years later, the river is being ripped away from Muriel.

The Baaka River is in crisis and so too are the Barkandji.

The Barkandji belong to the river - it is in their name, it is their culture, their heritage and their life.

But water has stopped flowing down the river as the insatiable greed from floodplain harvesting in the northern basin has sucked the river dry.

In the last 20 years storages in the north have increased by 152 per cent. This is not climate change - this is greed on such a massive and incomprehensible scale it has stopped a river flowing and forced a community into poverty.

The delicate eco system of the Darling-Baaka River is imploding, taking with it a community so entrenched with the cycle of the river, they are lost without

The fish are long gone, as are the kangaroos, the emus, the vabbies and the mussels - the food source and the totems of the Barkandji have all disappeared into the dust.

There are times when the water quality is so poor, contact

results in an angry red rash, while other times it is stagnant and putrid - often there is no water at all.

It is hard to believe the people of Wilcannia in 2021 have to live below the poverty line their life expectancy is just 38 years for men and 42 for wom-

It is a well-known fact when there is water in the river, crime rates are down and the community's mental and physical wellbeing is much improved.

And yet, the sadness within Muriel is palpable as she gazes out across a once mighty Baaka River that today is a dirty, muddy streak in the riverbed.

As a young child she can remember a river so clear she could see fish swimming around the bottom.

"Before I got stolen we used to see catfish and now we don't see them no more, they are all gone," Muriel said.

Muriel knows what it is like to live without her river. She was forced to spend 13 long years away from it.

"Badger and my oldest brother were the lucky ones because Granny used to take them and put them in her canoe and take them up river to get away, but me and my three other brothers were all taken.

"They reckon I was uncontrollable because I broke out of all of them places but I just wanted to get home, back to the river."

Muriel carried with her an old black and white picture of the

she was released at eighteen she only had one destination in mind.

"I just asked them people which way to get to that town and that's how I found my way back - the river is my life," Muriel said.

And now, six decades later, Muriel is losing her river again.

The Baaka River is no longer the mighty and majestic river of Muriel's childhood full of fish, mussels, yabbies and ducks, while the reeds she used to

peared a long time ago.

"We lost the reeds when they buggered up the river years ago. We have a big hole in our hearts when we see the river like this, we just want the river to be natural like it used to be."

megalitres has put water into the system, however, it pales into insignificance after two million megalitres were taken by unlicensed and unmetered irrigators in the north.

And the Barkandji are meant

to be grateful for what is nothing more than a token gesture and a mere scrap of water.

"This is our mother river and she is our life and we feel really happy when water is here, but how long is the water going to stay this time?" Muriel said.

'Apprehensive' Approach to Draft Water Strategy

An "apprehensive approach" is being taken to the draft NSW Water Strategy, released this week. Speak Up Campaign chair Lachlan Marshall said developing a clearly defined strategy was "a step in the right direction," but there remained a high level of mistrust in communities around the NSW Government's water management.

"The first priority in the draft strategy is to 'build community confidence and capacity through engagement, transparency and accountability'. While that would be very much welcomed, it will take a significantly different approach to what we have seen in the past decade," Mr Marshall said.

He added "words in a glossy document" is not what communities want or need.

"We need action to improve water management and repair the damage that has occurred to our agricultural sector, our communities and the environment," Mr Marshall said.

"Water policy decisions over the past two decades have seen the reliability of General Security Entitlements in the NSW Murray plummet from above 80 per cent in the mid 1980s, to a yield of now sub 50 per cent.

"This cannot all be attributed to climate change; policy decisions have had a major impact on water availability to food producers in one of the most diverse food bowls in the nation. And it is wreaking havoc."

Mr Marshall said removing policy makers out of regional centres and locating them in city offices has resulted in isolated decision making, where local knowledge is disregarded.

He described the Snowy Hydro Scheme as "a great example of the disconnect between the southern food bowl and the city decision-makers",



and is concerned that under the latest water strategy the NSW Murray would "miss out again".

"Proceeds from the sale of Snowy Hydro are going to fund water infrastructure projects in six valleys across our state, all outside the Murrumbidgee and Murray Valleys.

"The Snowy Hydro Scheme was designed to not only generate electricity, but also open up our irrigation regions and provide food security. Meanwhile, we have seen our reliability slashed yet no effort to use funds from the Snowy Hydro sale to protect or shore up our water supply.

"Over two years ago we discussed ways the sale funds could be used with Deputy Premier John Barilaro, but it seems he left town and lost interest. This is another example of why we get frustrated and lose faith in the state government and its bureaucracy - there doesn't seem to be any desire to fix the problems which have been created

Mr Marshall therefore encouraged NSW DPIE to look beyond its own bureaucracy and local government for advice on water planning issues, and start engaging effectively with stakeholder leaders who have holistic knowledge of water issues and the impacts of decision making.

"This is the key to a successful strategy. We need key departmental staff returned to our region and genuine efforts to collaborate and develop solutions," Mr Marshall said.

"Writing a fluffy document is not enough."

How to Develop a New Habit

Building new habits can feel impossible to navigate. It is a common belief that a new habit takes 21 days to develop. Step 1. Get super clear. You need to know exactly what it is you want to do. The clearer it is in your mind, the easier it is to create. Break it down into clear, simple terms of what it is you want.

Step 2. Know your why. You need to know, at least 10 reasons 'deep', why you want that new habit. Keep digging into each reason to eventually find the real reason. This creates a strong reason for you to stick to it.

Step 3. Make a commitment. You need to commit 100% for at least the next 30 days to this new habit; a nice trackable number for you to follow.

Step 4. Make yourself accountable. Get someone else involved or find someone to support you with your habit change.

Step 5. Associate the new habit with an old habit. When you connect it to an already established habit, it makes it easier for you to continuously do it. For example, as soon as you have completed a habit you already have daily, you will then do your new habit.

Step 6. Plan for obstacles. This one is important; setbacks are very common and having a plan to get around them makes a big difference. What can you see getting in the way of you accomplishing your new habit? What strategies can you put in place to overcome those obstacles?

Step 7. Master the mindset. Picture the person you are wanting to become by creating this new habit. Learn to step into that role before you have even mastered the habit. Create a whole persona for the person you aspire to be. That way, when you get stuck, you ask yourself, "what would my future self, who already has this consistent habit, do in this moment?"

Step 8. Reward yourself. Make the rewards in alignment with the lifestyle you are trying to create with your new habit.

It is always important to start slow and build one habit at a time. Once the habit feels like it is consistent and requires little thought, add in another new habit.



Bad News

"SHHHH! The news is on, be quiet, I'm trying to listen!"

I can still hear Dad's abrupt voice as the 6 o'clock news came on of an evening, my brothers and I running around making a racket.

In our family home when I was a kid, it was an unwritten rule that as soon as the news came on, we were to sit in silence as a family as we had our lesson in current affairs and world news

As Dad sat in his chair with a glass of beer, Mum would catch glimpses of the stories in between preparing the dinner. We could not wait for the commercial breaks to come on so we could speak!

The news bulletin went for 30 minutes, stories were brief and direct, and I always remember the weatherman pointing out all the cities on the massive cardboard map being the most exciting part of the bulletin. When the news finished, we ate dinner, had our showers and got our pyjamas on, ready to watch A Country Practice, Family Ties or The Flying Doctors – as a family. It was what most families did back then. We ate together

ally just one television set per household. (Who would have thought we could survive with just one?)

Now let's fast forward a generation.

We now have a news update at least every hour, on the hour, on free-to-air viewing, that's on the television and does not include the continuous updates online. Then there are the stations that run news only for 24 hours a day. More and more breaking news constantly shoved in our faces, has made the 6 o'clock 'family time' a thing of the past at least in my household.

Is that because I am too busy to sit and watch the news? Well, partly, but more importantly it is due to me wanting to avoid all of the 'bad news' that seems to be infiltrating through the entire bulletin. Recently I have found myself flicking the television off as soon as the news comes on due to the anxiety the stories are causing my children. I had not realised what was causing all of the questions I was being asked each night when I put them to bed. When



I would go in and say goodnight to them, I would be getting all the questions – "why did that man murder his family?" "How often do earthquakes kill people and are we going to die from them?" "Will you and Dad die from COVID-19?" "Do kids get cancer or just old people and will I die from cancer?" So here I was, instead of looking forward to the snuggles goodnight, I was dreading going in to tuck my children in because of the difficult questions that were keeping them from falling asleep in peace.

How things have changed. Where my parents used to make us sit down and watch the news for educational purposes, I now, as a

parent myself, avoid the news at all costs, not only for my own sanity but for the protection of my children. These days I feel that the only thing they are learning from the news is that awful feeling in their tummies called 'anxiety.'

Yes, I want my children to be resilient and aware, but I also want them to be children for as long as possible. How can we expect them to understand why someone murders, what their chances are of being killed by an earthquake or the likelihood of them getting cancer? Call me a helicopter parent, I don't care, I just don't want to expose my children to such tragedy and fear before their brains are mature enough to fully understand it.

They say too much exposure to gaming devices is bad for their health. I get that and definitely agree, but watching the daily news, I believe, is equally as bad or if not worse. Learning about how to be kind and respectful, carefree and confident, and to speak up when they are afraid. These are vital life lessons that no news bulle-

tin will tell them about. Already after just a few weeks of switching off the news, the anxiety and difficult questions have eased right off. I may not be able to protect them from schoolyard tales and of course kids will be kids in that regard, but switching off is helping my children to 'switch off' to the often sensationalised news stories that are trying to turn them into adults overnight.

If we'd been told in 2019 that we'd all be wearing face masks and staying home in 2020, and taking on a whole new way of life we've had to adopt, people would have found it difficult to believe."

The Christian story requires us to step into an unbelievable account - a wild take of a virgin birth, miracles, healing, and resurrection from the dead. It invites us to believe in a totally new world; one where God has stepped in and shown us a new way to live. A whole new framework which challenges the realities we thought we knew – that we are on our own, that life is infinite and even that the dead stay dead. Perhaps the most fantastic thing about

the Christian story is that it calls us to step into a world which is turned on its head. Fear becomes hope, hate turns to love, death is transformed into eternal life. We are pulled out of obscurity, isolation, and loneliness, into relationship - those who ostracised, marginalised, shunned and alone, become part of God's story in the world, welcomed and accepted.

So, at LENT what do I give up? Forget chocolate and wine. This is harder.

Give up complaining, focus on Gratitude. Give up pessimism, become an Optimist. Give up worry, trust Divine providence. I did warn you it was hard. More next

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GEE GEE Gone...

The new Gee Gee Bridge over the Wakool River and flood approach have been utilised since their opening last year. The project's completion was a welcome relief to farmers and road transporters as load restrictions have been in place for some time.

The original Gee Gee Bridge's long and interesting history has now come to an end after removal of the bridge.

Gee Gee Bridge and surrounds were a vital part of the local redgum milling history. A sawmill operated on the banks of the Wakool River from the early 1920s to about 1940. At its peak, there were about 20 families and a multitude of single workmen living there. It resembled a small township.

Readers of The Bridge may remember the late James Lowe, whose story featured last year.

James' family arrived at Gee Gee,

travelling from Cohuna via unmade roads on a solid-tyred Leyland open to the elements, which was not the height of luxury, arriving about dusk to a house that was a large open-ended barn. James was six years old (1932).

James described growing up at Gee Gee as full of adventure but also of hardship. James recalled, "It was the norm in those days of the Depression. We had no phone or electricity and, in time, had a kerosene fridge."

"A trip to Swan Hill perhaps twice a year with two shillings and sixpence to spend was... WOW!" said James.

The steep cutting below the new bridge was evidently made for Cobb & Co. probably hence the name Gee Gee Crossing. I hear there is a change in name proposed for this new bridge, which is a pity because there will be much history lost.

Many memories remain to so many people, such as the farmers to whom the bridge meant so much. Gee Gee Crossing will always be known and remembered by our family by that name. I would petition to have the new bridge maintain the name that has had such meaning for so many for well over a century.

"I started to inject a few more days from home, then COVID-19 hit, and it was every day from home," he

Since COVID-19 hit, employers like Mark's are increasingly realising that working from home is a viable option, and it was not long before he got a call from one of his executives saying, "if

this thing's done anything, it's taught us that everybody can work from anywhere, so you've got our blessing to do what you need to do." That was the 'permission' they needed to make the big move

Lack of Childcare Frustrating

Lack of childcare in Cohuna is causing families to relocate and, in some cases, reconsider the number of children they have. The struggle has become so frustrating for one young family, they are now exploring the possibility of an independent childcare establishment.

Tenielle and Jye Edge both work full time, and with their two boys, 3-year-old Jax and 2-year-old Tex, have juggled a host of childcare options since the start of 2020. At one point they were between three family day-carers, and when CO-VID-19 hit, their main day-carer was forced to close, leaving them in the lurch.

In a bid to both keep their jobs, the couple moved to Echuca to access childcare there, securing spots instantly and giving the boys a consistent routine. While the boys loved their new placements, Tenielle and Jye struggled with the daily work commute to Cohuna.

Tenielle explained, "The cost of living in Echuca and the two of us travelling every day, was just too high and we couldn't justify it. So, at the beginning of term four, 2020, we moved back to Cohuna and employed an au pair. She was fantastic; we loved her so much but after a term it was time for her to move on to explore the rest of Australia.

"In December last year I started ringing around trying to find care for the boys. There was nothing. We were on every wait list there was, but so were 10 other people or more. Jye and I had to start discussing who was going to quit their job, and I just thought, surely in 2020, parents don't have to be having this conversation."

The Edges would like to have a third child but say the stress of childcare makes it impossible. In addition to putting the boys in family day-care once a week, they pay a private babysitter, the fees of which do not attract government assistance.


Tenielle believes that lack of childcare can lead to families leaving the area. "We are constantly considering leaving the area, just as many other families have [left], and will leave. So many businesses and companies in Cohuna struggle to find employees or keep employees because of this issue as well. It also affects the mental health of parents. It's okay in this day and age to admit that sometimes we

are better parents when we have a job and a different purpose every day. I know I am."

She continues, "The Shire has also gone and put so much money into Apex Park in Cohuna but doesn't realise that families will continue to move away, and there will be no one left to use the park or run the businesses that the tourists want."

Other parents facing the same challenges have thrown their support behind Tenielle. A petition attracted over 500 names and gained the attention of childcare franchises who have advised on next steps to take. An independent analysis has been arranged and discussions will follow on how to proceed from there.



Mt Everest Spectacular

It is winter in the northern hemisphere. Parts of the Thames River in London have frozen over in the last few weeks for the first time in 26 years, and much of the United States has been affected by a 'polar vortex' producing some of its coldest temperatures in living memory. This reminds me of cold temperatures which Ted Endacott and myself experienced on a visit to Nepal years ago, when we trekked from the airport at Lukla to Mt Kalar Pattar, a 5,545m peak beside Mt Everest in the Himalayas. Temperatures on this 17day trek dropped to minus 18 degrees Celsius according to the thermometer Ted carried. On the day we climbed Mt Kalar Pattar, the maximum day temperature reached minus 10 degrees centigrade.

Those of us who travel by air into this spectacular, but cold, location land at a small mountain town called Lukla. Lukla is regarded by some as having the most dangerous airfield in the world. I remember that the Swiss pilot of the Pilatus Porter aircraft we travelled in landed us beautifully on the very steep runway -12-degree slope. Its altitude is 2,860m. The thin air, highly changeable weather and steeply sloping, short airfield contributes to it being hazardous. It is the gateway to the high Himalayas and so is used extensively by trekkers - like Ted and myself – and also by the more serious expeditions hoping to summit Mt Everest.

On arrival at Lukla, some of the world-famous Sherpas of Nepal gathered around our plane. Soon we gained the services of Dadoge and his brother - two very capable Sherpas who acted as our guides, cooks and pack carriers. Soon we were trekking through breathtaking scenery on the way to Namche Bazaar – the main centre for the Khumbu area. Here was a place to buy supplies and acclimatise to the high altitude as we continued our slow journey to Everest base region. High altitude sickness is

caused by gaining altitude too quickly and not allowing the body enough time to adjust to reduced oxygen and changes in air pressure, thus causing hypobaric hypoxia - a lack of oxygen reaching the tissues of the body. If not careful, this can bring about debilitating symptoms and even cause death.

When our altitude reached

3,800m we had arrived at Tengboche. This town was the site for the world's highest altitude hotel - with spectacular views looking all the way up the valley to Mt Everest itself. The route up the Khumbu Valley was spectacular, with snow-covered peaks towering above us on both sides. Sometimes yaks squeezed past us on the main trekking track – it is important to get on the upper side of the track as, on the low side, one might be pushed off by one of these animals and risk falling into the deep ravine below. Some trekkers have died this way. Eventually we climb above

the vegetation zone and onto Mt Kala Pattar –summiting at 5,545m. From the summit there is an amazing view of Mt Everest (8,848m) and other peaks such as Mt Lhotse and Nuptse. Interacting with the Nepalese people is a wonderful experience and the scenery all around is breathtaking. I am reminded of the Bible verse: For ever since the world was created, people have seen the earth and sky. Through everything God made, they can clearly see His invisible qualities—His eternal power and divine nature. So they have no excuse for not knowing God. Romans 1:20. We live in a very damaged creation now but our Creator's 'fingerprints' are still around for us to see its wonder, beauty, size and complexity.

Of course, our Creator has also revealed Himself

Mt Everest is the black 'pyramid' shape on the upper right of the photo – fairly bereft of snow because of its steep slopes and penetration into the high altitude 'jet streams' very high speed winds which blow much snow off the summit.
